Digital health and home automation announcements from three major tech companies - Samsung, Apple and Google resulted in a number of news headlines over recent weeks. These are still early announcements but essentially we could be seeing a shift from thousands of standalone health apps into platform arrangements and portals that can bring together data from a number of sources/devices in one place. Interest in mhealth, digital health and aspects of remote monitoring has never been greater, but still many barriers remain. As clinical commissioning groups and local authorities refine their Better Care Fund plans during 2014/15, there is growing interest in self care and self management to reduce hospital admissions particularly for those with long term conditions. A significant reduction in admissions will be key to the success of the local plans. To support this interest in self care, the Technology Strategy Board and dallas programme have an important event on 'Self Care in the Digital Age' on 24 June 2014 at The King's Fund – if you are not attending, do join in the online discussions using the webcast and social media (#selfcare14). There is an also an updated supplement on the Better Care Fund plans covering self care/self-management this month.

(i) Self care in the Digital Age – 24 June 2014



The audience of policy makers, commissioners and healthcare practitioners will debate how new technology can assist in the evolution of healthcare; and how self-care is being adopted in the UK.



<u>Impact assessment: draft regulations and guidance for implementation of Part 1 of the Act in 2015/16</u>

The Department of Health has made available a new, one off grant to support local authorities to implement the Care Act, from May 2014 to 2015. The grant determination is accompanied by an agreement which explains what the Department of Health expects from recipient local authorities.

- (iv) A Department of Health <u>letter</u> clarifies the transfer of NHS money to local authorities to support social care with a health benefit. This covers both the main NHS transfer and Better Care Fund preparation. The letter also confirms adults' personal social services (PSS) specific revenue and capital grant funding for local authorities for the period 2014 to 2015.
- (v) NHS England (@nhsengland) has <u>launched</u> the Medicines Optimisation Prototype Dashboard, designed to encourage CCGs and trusts to think more about how well their patients are supported to use medicine and less about focusing on cost and volume of drugs. The prototype dashboard brings together data in one place and includes prescribing comparators, as well as looking at areas such as medication safety and utilisation of community pharmacy services. Up to 50% of medicines are not taken as intended and between five and eight per cent of all unplanned hospital admissions are due to medication issues. This figure rises to 17% in the over 65s age group. Medicines waste is a significant issue £300 million in primary care alone, about half of which is avoidable.

(vii) From NHS England - Tim Kelsey, NHS England's National Director for Patients and Information has recently visited the Hurley Group practice in London and reports on their innovative approach to allow patients to "consult their own GP from home or work using an online tool that captures a safe, structured history which the GP can use to triage remotely." Tim Kelsey says feedback on the new system is dramatic with 24,000 patients having used it in the first six months and 78 per cent saying it had saved them time. This included hundreds of patients opting to consult online rather than visiting their GP. (Guardian article).
