There were over 1200 links of interest during May 2015 with over 100 journal articles – sadly, we are unable to bring them to you in a curated format at this time.

Going forward we need your support. Some UK News Headlines this week

(i) There are questions over the Government's pledge to recruit 5000 additional GPs by 2020 (<u>Guardian article</u>). On the BBC <u>website</u>, Nick Triggle asks whether nurses will become the new doctors.

(ii) Catch up with some of the highlights of the recent Digital Health and Care congress in London via the King's Fund <u>Website</u> along with a <u>blog</u> from Matthew Honeyman.

(iii) Tunstall Healthcare Group is to invest up to £100m over the next five years bringing the company into the digital age at a time when an ageing population is increasingly switching to care in the home (<u>Yorkshire Post article</u>).

(iv) Google has unveiled a new health-focused wristband that provides constant patient information for participants in medical studies and clinical field trials (<u>TechCrunch article</u>).

(v) Community pharmacists across England will be given the opportunity to access the Summary Care Record (<u>HSCIC report</u>).

(vi) From the U.S.: Nearly 20 years after videoconferencing technology has been available for health services, fewer than 1 percent of Medicare beneficiaries use it (<u>Healthcare IT News</u>). Meanwhile, Mobihealthnews covers a Tractica <u>report</u> which suggests that medical video consultations and visits will increase from 19.7 million annually in 2014 to 158.4 million per year by 2020.

(vii) Telecare Services Association have some video clips from the recent Cheshire <u>event</u> on 12 June 2015.

(viii) More than 1,000 people living with long-term conditions in Northern Ireland are regularly monitoring their own vital signs at home, <u>according</u> to Telemonitoring NI.

(ix) People will be able to add data from wearable devices to their electronic patient record by 2018, <u>according to</u> Tim Kelsey from NHS England.
