# **4 Panel Session - Telehealth**



**'Has telehealth been too focused on technology?'** with Dr Richard Pope (<u>Dynamic Health Systems</u>), Dr Martin McShane (<u>NHS England</u>), Ian Dalton (<u>BT Global Services</u>) and Beverley Bryant (<u>NHS England</u>). England).

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Dr Martin McShane (NHS England) said that putting people in control of their own care could be transformational - "We need to put person-centred care central to what we do. If we are really going to do this we need to make sure people are empowered and in control. We need to support professional collaborations and draw upon evidence. We need to work out how we plan, invest, monitor and improve services using resources to best effect. All this is enabled by digital technology and we need to re-engage hearts and minds regarding the potential telehealth can deliver. Technology systems need to allow people to say 'I own my own care'. We need to look at the system levers that stop us getting pull across the system – I bet there isn't a single healthcare professional that goes to work saying 'how difficult can I make this for patients?' We need training, education and narrative to deliver potential for technology enabled care systems." (<u>NHS England article</u>).

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Sarah-Jane Marsh, Chief Executive of Birmingham Children's Hospital, spoke passionately about the role of data and information in safeguarding and patient safety. Sarah-Jane said the NHS must change the way it thinks about data, claiming, "Security trumps patient safety every time. It is our duty to challenge this principle. We can't just assess the risk of doing something; we must also assess the risks of not doing something." She challenged NHS England to explain the benefits to the public and said, "We must help people understand that this is not something we should just do for ourselves. In my mind, we must do this to help the generations of the future. We cannot afford to keep making the same mistakes." (From <u>NHS England Article</u>).

#### 8 Social Command Centre

Occupying a large stand at Expo was the (<u>NHS England</u>) and <u>Salesforce</u> Social Command Centre.



Using <u>Radian 6 Technology</u> and customised queries it is possible to carry out sentiment analysis in real time – ie what people are saying about the NHS or any health and care topic in terms of positive and negative commentary on a range of social media including Facebook, Twitter, LinkedIn, public forums etc. In future, this can be used to improve planning of consultations and track specific local problems as they arise eg in a hospital or care home.

The second <u>Change Day</u> accumulated over 300,000 pledges by 3 March and now stands at over 580,000 just before the 31 March close.
